



Grants Report 2025

Black Heritage Preservation Program Grants

Indiana Landmarks Black Heritage Preservation Program awards grants to help preserve and raise awareness of sites important to Black history in Indiana. In fiscal year 2024-2025, the group made 26 grants totaling \$300,682.

Arda, Chicago: \$7,750 for design work, visioning, and community engagement exploring reuse options for the 1931 Roosevelt High School in Gary.

Ball State Center for Historic Preservation, Muncie: \$5,922 for a building assessment to prioritize repair needs of the Baneker Community Center, located in the 1915 Benjamin Baneker School in Bloomington.

Black Onyx Management, Indianapolis: \$5,000 to conduct community engagement sessions exploring reuse possibilities for the 1931 Roosevelt High School in Gary.

City of Bloomington: \$20,000 for roof repairs for the Baneker Center, located in the 1915 Benjamin Baneker School.

Central Indiana Community Foundation/Colored Knights of Pythias, Indianapolis: \$25,000 for roof and mortar repairs on the 1911 lodge used by Indianapolis's Colored Knights of Pythias.

Grants awarded from Indiana Landmarks' 10 Most Endangered fund aid in repairs and exploring reuses for current and former sites on our 10 Most Endangered List, landmarks in imminent jeopardy around the state. In 2025, a \$2,000 grant was given to stabilize the c.1875 Sollman School (above) in Gibson County.

Edna Martin Christian Center, Indianapolis: \$10,000 to nominate the Martindale Historic District to the National Register of Historic Places.

Evansville African American Museum: \$5,000 for a community engagement session and to assist with the costs of a historical marker at the McGary Burial Ground.

Gary Roosevelt Alumni Association, Gary: \$5,000 to clean out and organize the contents removed from the 1931 Gary Roosevelt High School.

Good Samaritan Baptist Church, Indianapolis: \$25,000 for roof repairs on the 1920s building housing the church, established in 1929.

Greater St. Mark Missionary Baptist Church, Indianapolis: \$25,000 for roof repairs at the 1954 church.

Guidance Life-Skills and Mentoring, Indianapolis: \$25,600 to replace the roof on the organization's headquarters in a 1897 Colonial Revival-style home on Capitol Avenue, previously state headquarters of the Indiana Federation of Colored Women's Clubs.

Indiana University Trustees, South Bend: \$2,460 to help develop an augmented reality project for the Indiana University South Bend Civil Rights Heritage Center highlighting three sites with deep ties to the city's African American history, including the Chalfant Heights neighborhood.

Katie Hall Educational Foundation, Inc., Gary: \$10,000 for landscaping of a plaza surrounding a historical marker in front of the house of former Congresswoman Katie Hall, whose efforts led to Dr. Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday becoming a national holiday.

Kurt West Garner, Plymouth: \$4,000 to research Cabin Creek Settlement and Scott Corner Settlement in Randolph County in preparation for nominating both settlements' historic Black cemeteries to the National Register of Historic Places.

Lost Creek Grove Restoration and Preservation Foundation, Terre Haute: \$7,200 to nominate the Lost Creek Grove Historic District in Vigo County to the National Register of Historic Places.

Madam Walker Legacy Center, Indianapolis: \$2,500 to develop walking tours of the 1927 Walker Building and Indiana Avenue.

New Hope Missionary Baptist Church, Indianapolis: \$20,000 for roof and foundation repairs on the 1950 church.

The Oaks Academy, Indianapolis: \$10,000 to create a memorial commemorating King and King Funeral Home, a historic Black funeral home that served Indianapolis's east side from the 1930s to 1980s.

One Vision in Christ Community, Indianapolis: \$10,000 to replace an HVAC unit in the 1941 church.

Philips Temple CME Church, Indianapolis: \$20,000 for roof replacement on its 1928 church.



Indiana Landmarks Black Heritage Preservation Program awards grants to help preserve and raise awareness of sites connected to the state's African American heritage. In 2025, a \$7,200 grant from the program helped nominate the Lost Grove Historic District in Vigo County to the National Register of Historic Places. The district's collection of landmarks (above) near Terre Haute are remnants of one of the state's earliest settlements of free people of color.

Positive Image Consulting, LLC, Gary: \$5,000 to conduct community engagement sessions on repurposing Roosevelt High School in Gary.

Shaffer Chapel AME, Muncie: \$10,000 to install a chair lift in the c.1893 building.

Union Literary Institute Preservation Society, Lynn: \$10,750 for brick repairs on the mid-nineteenth century remains of Union Literary Institute.

Van Buren Missionary Baptist Church, Gary: \$7,000 to paint trim on the 1955 church.

Wayman Chapel AME Church, Princeton: \$2,500 for research on radiation experiments conducted on African American children of Lyles Station in 1927.

Zion Hope Baptist Church, Indianapolis: \$20,000 for foundation repairs to the 1956 church.

Efroymsen Family Endangered Places Grants

Efroymsen Family Endangered Places grants support architectural and structural assessments, rehab cost analyses, reuse studies, and fundraising planning. In the last fiscal year, Indiana Landmarks made 14 grants totaling \$49,840. The fund honors the Efroymsen family's significant support of our endangered places programs.

City of Logansport: \$3,500 for an updated rehabilitation assessment of the 1855/1922 Logansport-Cass County Memorial Center.

Delphi Preservation Society: \$2,560 for a structural assessment of the 1906 Delphi interurban station.

Elston Memorial Foundation, Crawfordsville: \$4,000 for development of historic structures report for 1882 Queen Anne-style house.

Hobart Historical Society: \$3,840 for a rehabilitation assessment of the 1914 Carnegie Library that houses the historical society.

Prairie Preservation Guild, Fowler: \$4,000 for a rehabilitation assessment of the 1876 Benton County Sheriff's Residence and Jail in Fowler.

Richmond Art Museum: \$4,000 for a feasibility study of the 1941 McGuire Memorial Hall in the National Register-listed Richmond High School.

Saving Historic Orange County, Paoli: \$2,500 for a structural assessment of the 1895 Mineral Springs Hotel following storm damage.

Seymour Main Street: \$4,000 for an engineering assessment of two nineteenth-century commercial buildings on Second Street in the city's downtown historic district.

Sisters of St. Benedict, Ferdinand: \$4,000 for a feasibility study of the 1905 Annex and 1950 Kordes Hall at the National Register-listed Monastery Immaculate Conception campus.

Southeast Indiana United Methodist Church, Wilmington: \$4,000 for a feasibility study of repurposing the 1865 church as an events center.

Indiana Landmarks' Efrogymson Endangered Place grants help communities plan next steps for local landmarks, supporting architectural and structural assessments, reuse studies, and fundraising planning. A \$4,000 grant from the fund in 2025 aided a structural analysis of the 1937 Chauncey Rose Memorial Pavilion (below) in Terre Haute's Fairbanks Park.

Town of Kentland: \$1,440 to provide design guidance for a downtown façade grant program.

Town of Oolitic: \$4,000 for an engineering assessment for the town's 1920 limestone fire station.

UAW Local 1005, South Bend: \$4,000 for a structural analysis of the 1921 Indiana Lumber and Molding Company/UAW Building.

10 Most Endangered Grants

Each year, Indiana Landmarks uses its 10 Most Endangered list to call attention to landmarks in imminent jeopardy. Grants given through our 10 Most Endangered fund assist in rehabilitation studies, stabilization work, and exploring reuses for current and former sites on the list.

Covered Bridge Art Association, Rockville: \$2,000 for a rehabilitation assessment of the 1877 fraternal lodge building now serving as a community art gallery and educational center.

Indiana Landmarks: \$2,000 to help stabilize the c.1875 Sollman School in Gibson County.

Richmond Columbian Properties, Richmond: \$2,500 to aid rehabilitation of the 1885 William G. Scott House in the Starr Historic District.

Rokh Research and Design Studio, Indianapolis: \$2,500 for a planning grant to study repurposing the 1936 Fire Station 18.

Synergy Community Development Corporation, Los Angeles, Cal.: \$2,000 for a damage assessment of Bedford's 1917 Elks Building, a historic fraternal lodge, following an arson fire.





Historic Preservation Education Grants

Indiana Landmarks and Indiana Humanities jointly award grants to nonprofits for programs and materials educating the public about historic places. In the last fiscal year, the organizations awarded \$39,357 to 14 projects:

ARCH, Inc., Fort Wayne: \$2,350 for a lecture series on preservation-related topics including the Eero Saarinen-designed Wermuth House, Wildwood Builders, and the city's parks and boulevard system.

Auburn Cord Duesenberg Museum, Auburn: \$3,000 to develop a photo exhibit and related tours showcasing the city's architecture and automotive heritage.

Ball State University, Muncie: \$3,000 to record sessions at the 2025 Alliance for Historic Landscape Preservation conference and share online and through targeted outreach for broader public engagement.

Columbia City Connect, Columbia City: \$1,828 to install decals on storefronts throughout downtown sharing stories of historic figures, significant events, and architectural landmarks that are connected through QR codes to a digital tour with additional resources.

To help nonprofits share the stories of landmarks in their communities, Indiana Landmarks and Indiana Humanities jointly award Historic Preservation Education Grants for programs and materials about historic places. A \$2,350 grant in 2025 helped ARCH, Inc. develop a lecture series highlighting Fort Wayne landmarks, including the Modernist house (above) architect Eero Saarinen designed in 1941 for A.C. Wermuth, a general contractor and frequent collaborator with the Saarinens' firm.

Columbus Indiana Architectural Archives, Columbus: \$2,600 for public programs exploring historic buildings along Washington Street downtown, including the construction techniques and materials used and the people and businesses that occupied them.

Harrison Center, Indianapolis: \$3,000 to create a coloring and story book showcasing the architecture and history of the former First Presbyterian Church that houses the center, with QR codes linked to scavenger-hunt videos.

Land Stewards of Indianapolis: \$3,000 to digitize and preserve George Kessler's plans for several of Terre Haute's parks, also creating a gallery exhibit and virtual-reality program.

Newburgh Museum Foundation Corporation, Newburgh: \$3,000 to create signage with QR codes throughout downtown that showcases historic images and history.

Reitz Home Preservation Society and Museum, Evansville: \$3,000 to expand educational programming for elementary-age students enriching their understanding of local history, architecture, and the Victorian era.

Richmond Neighborhood Restoration, Richmond: \$3,000 for a series of renovation workshops on hardwood floor restoration, plaster repair, basic electric work, plumbing, painting, and tuckpointing.

Robert and Ellen Haan Museum of Indiana Art, Lafayette: \$3,000 to develop a learning kit on the role architecture and historic preservation play in place and community, showcasing the museum's historic mansion, which was the Connecticut pavilion at the 1904 St. Louis World's Fair.

Ruthmere Foundation, Elkhart: \$3,000 to develop an educational video for children sharing history of the Ruthmere Mansion, Havilah Beardsley House, and Beardsley family and the importance of preservation.



Still Waters Adult Day Center, Indianapolis: \$3,000 to create in partnership with the Indiana State Museum virtual tours of state historic sites and historic artifacts for seniors that utilize the center's services.

Town of Cumberland, Cumberland: \$2,579 to develop a self-guided tour and online exhibition sharing the stories, architecture, and significance of the town's historic district.

Indiana Automotive Grants

Indiana Automotive, an affinity group of Indiana Landmarks, awards grants that support preservation and help raise awareness of landmarks connected to the state's automotive heritage.

Howard County Historical Society: \$300 in support of children's educational activities highlighting Kokomo's automotive history and the legacy of automotive entrepreneur George Kingston.

South Bend TradeWorks: \$7,500 for restoration of the nonprofit's new space at South Bend's Spenner Garage, built in 1926 as a Ford car service and sales building.

Indiana Landmarks partners with the Central Indiana Community Foundation to aid preservation of landmarks in Marion County through the Marion County Preservation Fund. A \$7,500 grant to the City of Indianapolis in 2025 helped architectural plans for redevelopment of the 1929 Drake Apartments (above).

Indiana Modern Grants

Indiana Modern, an affinity group of Indiana Landmarks, awards planning and rehabilitation grants to help identify, promote, and preserve the best examples of twentieth-century architectural and landscape design.

Indiana Landmarks: \$1,800 for an oral history project documenting the stories behind the 1951 Applegate House in New Albany and 1964 Munich House in Clarksville.

Marion County Historic Preservation Fund

Indiana Landmarks and the Central Indiana Community Foundation jointly manage a fund created by contributions from each organization and private donors to award grants supporting preservation of landmarks in Marion County.

Indiana Landmarks: \$7,000 to update the National Register nomination for the 1924 Charles Sommers House owned by Marian University.

City of Indianapolis: \$7,500 for architectural plans for redevelopment of the 1929 Drake Apartments.

Emmaus Lutheran Church: \$2,500 for a feasibility analysis and historic preservation plan for the 1903 church.

Irvington Historical Society: \$4,000 to repair and repaint historic windows at the 1903 Bona Thompson Library.

Irvington Presbyterian Church: \$2,500 for a feasibility analysis and historic preservation plan for the 1929 church.

Psychic Science Spiritualist Church: \$2,000 for a conditions assessment of the c.1909 Lieber House.

Saint Athanasius the Great Church: \$2,500 for a building assessment of the 1884 Byzantine Catholic church on the city's south side.

Zion Evangelical United Church of Christ: \$2,500 for a feasibility analysis and historic preservation plan for the 1911 church.

Seven of the Efroymson Family Fund grants support projects managed by Indiana Landmarks:

\$12,500 for exterior restoration of the 1915 **Poledor House** in South Bend.

\$10,000 to develop study of historic resources associated with **Indiana's agricultural industry** statewide, such as farmsteads, barns, and grain elevators.

\$5,000 to extend the reach of **Indiana Landmarks Black Heritage Preservation Program's Oral History Harvest** project interviewing older African Americans around the state.

\$10,000 to provide training and professional development opportunities for **Indiana Landmarks staff**.

\$10,000 for Indiana Landmarks' **10 Most Endangered program**.

\$12,000 for rehabilitation of the 1813 **McCormick's Tavern** in Vevay.

\$3,000 to hire consultant to nominate Terre Haute's **Allendale neighborhood** to the National Register of Historic Places.

Dovie Stewart Cox & Chester A. Cox, Sr. Memorial Fund and Standiford H. Cox Fund, Funds of CICF

Indiana Landmarks' Black Heritage Preservation Program serves as preservation advisor to the Dovie Stewart Cox & Chester A. Cox, Sr. Memorial and Standiford H. Cox funds of the Central Indiana Community Foundation, recommending projects aiding historic African American sites throughout the state. In 2025, the fund awarded \$200,000 to 15 projects:

Allen Chapel AME Church, Indianapolis: \$15,000 for repairs to steps and a new accessible ramp and concrete walks at the 1927 church in the Chatham Arch Historic District.

Community Foundation of Boone County, Lebanon: \$10,000 for HVAC updates and exterior insulation at an 1880 building used historically by Lebanon AME Church, now being adapted as a vacation rental with interpretive displays sharing its history as a Black church.

Historic Eleutherian College, Lancaster: \$20,000 for restoration of the c.1850 limestone Hoyt House, recognized as part of the National Park Service's Network to Freedom.

Historic Madison, Inc.: \$10,000 for repairs to masonry and doors at the 1850 former African Methodist Episcopal church building in the historically African American Georgetown neighborhood.

New Hope Missionary Baptist Church, Indianapolis: \$20,000 to for a new roof to halt water infiltration at the c.1925 church located in the city's Brightwood neighborhood.

Efroymson Family Fund

Indiana Landmarks serves as preservation advisor to the Efroymson Family Fund of the Central Indiana Community Foundation, recommending projects throughout the state for grants. In 2025, the fund awarded \$100,000 to 13 projects:

Blue River Community Foundation, Shelbyville: \$10,000 to stabilize the 1910 Montgomery-Rudicel Polygonal Barn near Waldron.

Children's Museum of Evansville: \$7,500 to restore the original elevator in the building constructed in 1931 as the Evansville Public Library.

Elston Memorial Foundation, Crawfordsville: \$5,000 for a historic structures report to help guide restoration of the 1882 Elston House.

Old Town Players, Vincennes: \$7,000 for exterior rehabilitation work on the 1913 First Baptist Church used by the group as a community theater and arts center.

Saving Historic Orange County, Paoli: \$3,000 to clean out the interior of the vacant 1895 Mineral Springs Hotel.

Indiana Association of Spiritualists, Chesterfield: \$5,000 for rehabilitation of the 1960 Maxon Fellowship Center within the Camp Chesterfield Historic District.

Indiana Landmarks Black Heritage Preservation Program recommends projects for grants from the Cox funds of the Central Indiana Community Foundation to aid historic African American sites throughout the state. A \$20,000 grant to Historic Eleutherian College will support restoration of the c.1850 Hoyt House (above), a site on the National Park Service's Network to Freedom.

New Life Development Ministries, Indianapolis: \$5,000 to support total roof and gutter replacement on the c.1920 Smallwood Block commercial building housing the ministry's re-entry training programs for ex-offenders.

Oaks Academy, Indianapolis: \$10,000 for custom window work to replace a non-historic window at the c.1920 school building housing the charter school and Paul Laurence Dunbar Library.

Olivet AME Church, South Bend: \$15,000 for interior and exterior repairs at the National Register-listed 1923 church building that has been home to the Black congregation since 1969.

Patoka Church of God in Christ, Gibson County: \$12,500 for a new air conditioning system and gutter repairs at the National Register-listed 1903 church and its 1960s addition.

Say Yes to Means, Gary: \$7,500 to create a signage program that calls attention to the historic Means Park Manor neighborhood, developed in the 1950s and '60s by brothers Andrew and Geter Means as quality affordable housing for Black citizens of Gary.

Second Baptist Church, Bloomington: \$20,000 for repairs to the roof and stained-glass windows at the Indiana limestone church designed by trailblazing Black architect Samuel Plato in 1913.

Shaffer Chapel AME Church, Muncie: \$10,000 for renovations to rehabilitate the lower level of the c.1893 building for congregational and community use.

Indiana Landmarks' Sacred Places program is a valuable partner to congregations with historic houses of worship, offering training and capital grants to help them preserve their historic churches. A \$25,000 planning grant is supporting a building conditions assessment at South Bend's 1949 Our Lady of Hungary Catholic Church.

Thomas Temple Church of God in Christ, Marion: \$15,000 to replace gutters and downspouts to halt water infiltration at the 1902 church building designed by Black architect Samuel Plato.

University United Methodist Church, Indianapolis: \$15,000 to install architecturally compatible energy-efficient replacement windows at the 1970 church.

Zion Hill Missionary Baptist Church, South Bend: \$15,000 to address repairs following water damage from a former leaky roof at the c.1917 church.

Sacred Places Indiana Grants

In the fiscal year 2024-25, Indiana Landmarks' Sacred Places program awarded \$2,928,981 to 31 distinct congregations to address needs at their historic houses of worship. Grants were awarded from the Sacred Places Indiana Fund and to graduates of the *New Dollars/New Partners* training program to assist in preservation planning and address significant capital needs.

All Souls Unitarian Universalist Church, Indianapolis \$25,000 planning grant for a building conditions assessment and fundraising feasibility study at the 1959 Mid-Century Modern church.

Allen Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church, Indianapolis \$60,000 capital grant for stained-glass window repairs at the 1927 Gothic Revival-style church. The congregation also received a \$25,000 planning grant for a building conditions assessment and fundraising coaching services.

Bethlehem Lutheran Church, Fort Wayne \$23,500 planning grant for a building conditions assessment of the 1939 Gothic Revival-style church.

Eden Church, Muncie \$25,000 planning grant for a building conditions assessment and fundraising feasibility study at the 1955 Neo-Gothic-style church.

First Baptist Church, Lafayette \$21,700 planning grant for a building conditions assessment and fundraising feasibility study at the Romanesque Revival-style church complex including the original 1872 sanctuary, 1884 fellowship hall addition, and 1961 education building.

First Christian Church, New Castle \$125,000 capital grant for limestone masonry repairs to the bell tower of the 1955 Neo-Gothic-style church. The congregation also received a \$24,950 planning grant for a comprehensive building conditions assessment of the church facility.

First Presbyterian Church, Martinsville \$17,300 planning grant for a building conditions assessment of the 1881 Gothic Revival-style church building.

Gobin Memorial United Methodist Church, Greencastle \$260,000 capital grant for a slate roof replacement on the 1928 Gothic Revival-style church. The congregation also received a \$25,000 planning grant to update a previous building conditions assessment and conduct a fundraising feasibility study to support the project.

Good Samaritan Missionary Baptist Church, Indianapolis \$20,000 planning grant on the historic Gothic Revival-style church and additions.

Hamline Chapel United Methodist Church, Lawrenceburg \$5,000 planning grant to conduct a building conditions assessment on the 1847 Greek Revival-style church.

Hazelwood Christian Church, Muncie \$15,000 planning grant for a building conditions assessment at the 1956 A-Frame-style church.

Irvington Presbyterian Church, Indianapolis \$180,000 capital grant for masonry and HVAC repairs to the 1929 Gothic Revival-style church. The congregation received a \$25,000 planning grant to complete a building conditions assessment and architectural design services to support the project.

Mount Zion Baptist Church, Indianapolis \$100,000 capital grant for HVAC replacement and roof repairs at the 1957 church designed in a Neo-Gothic style with Art Deco elements.

New Circle Church, Indianapolis \$50,000 capital grant to complete exterior repairs to masonry and roofing systems at the 1921 Gothic Revival-style building.

Our Lady of Hungary Catholic Church, South Bend \$25,000 planning grant for a building conditions assessment of the 1949 Romanesque Revival-style church.

Phillips Temple Christian Methodist Episcopal Church, Indianapolis \$25,000 planning grant to complete a building conditions assessment and fundraising feasibility study at the 1928 Art Deco-style church.

Roberts Park United Methodist Church, Indianapolis \$75,000 capital grant for repairs to a deteriorating chimney and interior plaster work at the 1876 Romanesque Revival-style church.

Sisters of Providence, St. Mary-of-the-Woods \$150,000 capital grant to modernize the fire suppression system at the 1891 Church of the Immaculate Conception. The grant also supports restoration of historic pews original to the sanctuary of the Renaissance Revival-style building.

St. Benedict Cathedral, Evansville \$200,000 capital grant for HVAC replacement at the 1927 Romanesque Revival-style church. The parish also received a \$25,000 planning grant for design and construction documents to guide the project.

St. Joseph Catholic Parish, Mishawaka \$400,000 capital grant for replacement of the original slate roof on the 1891 Gothic Revival-style church. The parish received a \$25,000 planning grant to support a fundraising feasibility study to assist in raising matching funds for the project.

St. Luke's United Church of Christ, Jeffersonville \$11,442 planning grant to document building conditions at the 1915 Gothic Revival-style church.

St. Mark's United Church of Christ, New Albany \$67,000 capital grant for stained-glass window restoration on the 1957 Mid-Century Modern church and exterior masonry repairs to the congregation's 1968 education building.

St. Paul Lutheran Church, Olean \$21,267 planning grant for a building conditions assessment of the 1921 Romanesque Revival-style church.

St. Paul's Episcopal Church, New Albany \$70,000 capital grant for structural repairs to the sanctuary undercroft at the 1895 Gothic Revival-style church.

St. Paul's Lutheran Church, Haysville \$125,000 capital grant for HVAC repairs at the 1948 Gothic Revival-style church.

St. Peter's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Indianapolis \$80,818 capital grant for bell tower repairs at the 1929 Gothic Revival-style church. The congregation also received a \$12,294 planning grant for architectural renderings to guide masonry repair work.

St. Stanislaus Bishop & Martyr Catholic Church, South Bend \$125,000 capital grant for structural repairs in the basement of the 1900 Gothic Revival-style church. The parish also received a \$25,000 planning grant for architectural design services and fundraising assistance for the project.

Trinity Episcopal Church, Fort Wayne \$275,000 capital grant for repairs to exterior masonry, structural repairs in the church undercroft, fire alarm upgrade, and stained-glass window restoration at the 1866 Gothic Revival-style church. The congregation received a \$25,000 planning grant to complete a building conditions assessment and a fundraising feasibility study.

Trinity United Methodist Church, Lafayette \$100,000 capital grant for repairs to historic stained-glass windows at the 1872 Gothic Revival-style church and a \$6,210 planning grant for a building conditions assessment.

Wayman Chapel African Methodist Episcopal Church, Lyles Station \$7,500 planning grant to conduct a structural boring report at the historic 1886 church.

Woodruff Place Baptist Church, Indianapolis \$25,000 planning grant to complete a building conditions assessment and fundraising feasibility study at the 1926 Renaissance Revival-style church.
